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As of this writing, we are in the thick of the annual leaf color-change season, and this year is shaping up to be a gorgeous display. I regularly travel to Indianapolis for seminary, and seeing the brilliant red, orange, and yellow trees along the interstate just about makes up for the miles-long stretches of construction. I encourage you to make some time to head out for a walk around your neighborhood, or Kickapoo if you can, or to take a drive around Vermilion County and check out the trees before all the leaves fall. I wish the trees would stay this beautiful for a long time, but I know that pretty soon all it will take is a big wind or rainstorm for the trees to be bare - then we will wait for months before fresh green leaves start to appear.

I met someone once who talked about how much she liked the "naked" trees of late fall and winter. I admit that I don't remember what her reason was because I was too busy thinking about how much I do not like the trees when they look like this. Even though I know that the leaves will be back soon enough, bare branches make me feel kind of sad, and they remind me that the wind is about to become frigid and sharp, instead of feeling soft and alive. The stark branches of fall and winter have always been something that I felt had to simply be endured. In recent weeks, though, I've seen this anonymous quote come across my Facebook feed several times: "The trees are about to show us how lovely it is to let things go." Perhaps you've seen this, or something like it, too. I thought this was an interesting idea, but I didn't think much about it until the idea of letting go came up in a congregational renewal conference I attended at the end of October.

One of the main messages of the conference was that you have to let something go in order to become something new. The presenters talked about congregations they worked with who had experienced renewal and growth once they were able to discern what they needed to let go of. This is not just a church development tactic - this is biblical. Sarah and Abraham had to let go of their family and homeland, not to mention their belief that they could not become parents past a certain age; Esther had to let go of fear of retribution for her Jewish heritage; James and John had to let go of their family and fishing career; and Jesus had to let go of His earthly life among us. But something new was born from all of these instances of letting go: Abraham and Sarah became the parents of many nations, Esther became the rescuer of her people, James and John became fishers of men, and Jesus became the embodiment of the Way, the Truth, and the Life. And that is lovely.

I wonder how this can be applied to our lives. Is there anything we can let go of at church or at home in order to become something new? Maybe it's an idea that never came to fruition, or a policy that no longer serves us well. Possibly it's a habit or relationship that is no longer healthy for us that we need to let go of. Or perhaps what we need to let go of is something that we do because it's the way we've always done it. As we watch the trees fulfill their purpose in a dazzling way, including letting go of their beauty, I invite you to consider what in your world is ready to become something new. May Christ's blessings go with you.

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## Díd You Know?

#### Stained Glass Window Restoration and Preservation



(As we prepare to raise funds to restore and preserve our stained-glass windows, I thought it would be interesting to learn a little about the history of these windows.)

In 1906 our church was renovated from the original church that was built at this location in 1884. It was built from materials saved from the original Oakwood Methodist Church built on the SE corner of Oakwood and Rt. 150. In 1906 the north side of the church was added. It included a Sunday school room, vestibule and bell tower. Although there was no bell at that time. The brick veneer was added to the outside, the stained-glass windows were chosen and the basement was dug out. The basement was finished in 1909.

In 1973 a tornado touched down near Oakwood and the

high winds associated with this tornado blew out the west side of the church breaking the stained glass windows, tearing open the roof and leaving the sanctuary covered with debris, mud and water. As a result the church trustees went to work repairing the windows, the roof, the walls, the flooring and the furniture. There were stained-glass windows above the altar. They were used to help repair the windows that were damaged. The cost to repair the stained glass windows at that time was around \$2,200.00 (The total damage repair was over \$16,500)

We presently have 6 large stained-glass windows on the South and West side of the sanctuary and 5 regular sized windows. It is estimated that the cost to replace these windows today would be about \$250,000.

After over 45 years these windows are in need of major preservation. The frames need to be scrapped, caulked, seals, primed and painted. The old storm windows need to be replaced with ones that will allow air circulation and with aluminum frames that will not need painting. Tim Cunningham has estimates for the repairs could cost around \$30,000. We already have over \$6000 committed to this project.

The congregation is being asked to help us raise the money needed to restore and preserve these priceless stained -glass windows. Please give whatever you can. Make your check payable to the Oakwood United Methodist Church with <u>"Windows"</u> on the memo line of your check. We hope to start the process this coming spring of 2020.




