February and March can be difficult. If you made resolutions in January and they aren't going well, you might feel discouraged. If you are susceptible to seasonal affective disorder (SAD), you might feel the winter blues extra hard right about now. Or, if winter is your least favorite season, you might just be impatiently waiting for winter to be done. I must admit that I fall into all of these camps, but especially that last one. I don't really mind the winter, and I even like an occasional snowfall - especially the kind of snowfall that sticks to the grass but not the road. But by February, I am tired of seeing bare tree branches outside. I am ready for new leaves and for the grass to be vibrant green again. I am ready to trade in winter coats and harsh winds for jackets and mild breezes. I'm longing for the smell of flowers in the air.

Last year, I had the opportunity to read Desmond Tutu's book, *God Has a Dream:* A Vision of Hope for Our Time. It's true that I had to read it for a class that I was in, but it was, and remains, such a blessing to me. One passage in the book really stuck out to me and has stayed with me since. Tutu describes a meeting he attended at a theological college that had closed down. During the discussions, he took a break in the garden for some quiet time. Tutu describes the scene: "It was winter: the grass was pale and dry and nobody would have believed that in a few weeks' time it would be lush and green and beautiful again." In this moment, Tutu recognized the power of transfiguration, or the transformation into something more beautiful. If you were experiencing winter for the first time, it would be hard to imagine the life that will spring forth once the seasons change. But because we have lived through winter before, we know it will; we can count on it.

Though they may be difficult, these months also contain one of our most sacred times of the liturgical year - Lent, which will include Holy Week once we get to April this year. Like the dead of winter, Lent can also feel like a desolate place. It's a period of waiting and penitence, which can sometimes feel like sorrow or despair. And even though Lent culminates in the death of our Lord on the cross, we must remember what happens next: the ultimate transfiguration. If you were one of the disciples and learning of or experiencing the death of Jesus for the first time, it would be hard to imagine that something beautiful could come from the grisly death of an innocent man. But because we are already Easter people, we know that God did something beautiful in the death and resurrection of Jesus.

As we move through the transfiguration of the winter landscape into spring, I urge you to allow God to use the season of Lent to work a transfiguration within yourself. Practice some spiritual disciplines every day: spend some time reading the Bible and in prayer, and spend some time giving to and serving others as often as you can - even small acts of kindness like holding the door for someone are a way to honor and value our fellow humans. Find ways to worship God every day, give thanks for all that God has done so far in your life, and ask for ways that God can continue to use you to bless others. Be the salt of the earth and the light of the world that Jesus said you already are.

"Abide with us, that so, this life of suffering over past, an Easter of unending joy we may attain at last." Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days, UMH 269

Easter around the world



Easter traditions are important, but they vary widely. While Americans dye hardboiled eggs, Kenyans carve soapstone eggs and present them as gifts in banana-fiber boxes. In Bermuda, locals fly homemade kites on Good Friday — a tradition that began when a teacher illustrated Christ's ascension to heaven using a cross-shaped kite.

Ethiopian Christians observe a 56-day fast from meat and all animal products. On Easter, they dress in white to worship in churches decorated with handmade fabric. Then they feast with non-Christians on roast chicken, goat and rice.

In France, church bells are silent between Holy Thursday and Easter to observe Jesus' Passion. According to legend, the bells grow wings and fly to Rome to be blessed, returning on Easter with chocolate and presents. In one town's main square, chefs make a giant omelet with 4,500 eggs to feed 1,000 people!


